Executive Summary

The Delaware County Office of the Medical Examiner (DCOME) has made tremendous strides this past year in staff development training, hiring, standardization of pathology services, improved data collection, and advances in toxicology efforts. The DCOME staff is a cohesive working unit, and morale stays positive in hopes of the anticipated new facility and professional development they receive.

In June 2023, the DCOME hired Amber Weeks as its new Chief of Forensic Investigations. Ms. Weeks comes to us from New Jersey, where she was a forensic investigator supervisor for the Southern Regional Medical Examiner's Office. She is a board-certified investigator with the American Board of Medicolegal Death Investigators (ABMDI), a registered nurse in NJ and PA, and holds a license in forensic nursing. Ms. Weeks is completing her studies toward her Doctor of Nursing Practice Degree through Hawai'i Pacific University.

In October 2023, the Delaware County Council appointed Dr. Albert Chu as the agency's Chief Medical Examiner. Dr. Chu leads morgue operations, including managing all pathologists, forensic specialists, and autopsy technicians. Dr. Chu completed his undergraduate and graduate studies at Johns Hopkins University and received his medical degree from the State University of New York at Buffalo. He then completed an Anatomic and Clinical Pathology residency at the Hospital of the University of Pennsylvania and a Forensic Pathology fellowship at the Office of the Chief Medical Examiner for the State of Maryland. Before becoming the Chief Medical Examiner at the DCOME, he served as an Assistant Medical Examiner at the Harris County Institute of Forensic Sciences in Houston, Texas, and as Deputy Chief Medical Examiner for the City of Philadelphia.

Five of the seven forensic investigators received their board-certification certificates from the American Board of Medicolegal Death Investigators (ABMDI) with the assistance and leadership of Ms. Weeks, who mentored them directly. One other investigator will hopefully receive her board certificate in 2024. This is a huge accomplishment and an agency requirement, as a certain percentage of the investigators are board-certified through ABMDI for NAME accreditation.

At the beginning of the year, the DCOME transitioned from an antiquated case management system to our new system called VertiQ (Moon). Moon is the central depository for all investigative records, pathology examination reports, and cremations. Later in the year, we successfully integrated two of our partner relationships into this case management system.

The DCOME transitioned to an accredited toxicology lab (NMS) that provides a wide range of specialized testing. The DCOME successfully integrated NMS and Moon for requests and automatically received toxicology results into Moon. The second entity successfully integrated was the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania's Electronic Death Reporting System (EDRS). Before the integration of EDRS, the process required the investigators to type in the same reports twice into two separate systems, now saving hundreds of work hours a year.

Other successes in 2023 included developing new Standard Operating Procedures (SOPs) and creating the County's first Mass Fatality Plan. In early 2024, a new format for publishing these policies will go live. This will provide risk management and compliance requirements for our future accreditation.

Ms. Weeks has developed and assigned different forensic investigators to specialized death review teams such as the child death review, violent death review, motor vehicle accident review, suicide review, and unidentified cold case review. Additionally, Ms. Weeks initiated a peer review program that provides quality improvement for all case files/investigations. This is also an accreditation requirement. In addition to those assignments, Ms. Weeks initiated several committees, such as wellness, community outreach, and education committees.

The DCOME has been quoted as the "place to be and work" and received many accolades from other agencies, such as the District Attorney's Office, Criminal Investigation Division (CID), and the local police agencies in Delaware County. In early 2023, the DCOME hired two full-time forensic investigators; all other positions were filled throughout the year. This is a big difference from past years when there was such a high employee turnover rate.

In 2023, the DCOME received and investigated 1,600 total reported deaths (jurisdiction accepted and terminated cases). An additional 2,205 cremation permits were investigated and issued. Of the jurisdiction accepted cases, there were 527 examinations (full, partial, or external), and an additional 217 cases were certified by record review. This is a decrease in reported and jurisdictional accepted deaths compared to the previous year. Of note, homicides decreased by 17%, from 41 incidents in 2022 to 34 in 2023; however, suicides showed a 26% increase (61 in 2022 compared to 77 in 2023).

Introduction

The Delaware County Office of the Medical Examiner (DCOME) proudly presents our 2023 Annual Report. The DCOME Annual Report provides specific information about deaths investigated by the DCOME County during the 2023 calendar year. This information is a resource for Delaware County citizens and leaders to identify trends in preventable deaths, which can be used to protect the lives of all Delaware County citizens through education and changes in public policy.

The DCOME is one of three counties in Pennsylvania that operate under a medical examiner system; the remaining counties in the Commonwealth are coroner's offices. In contrast to a coroner, who is an elected official who may or may not have any professional medical background, a medical examiner is a forensic pathologist who specializes in the study of sudden, unexpected, and/or violent death.

Not every death in Delaware County must be reported to or investigated by the DCOME. In fact, the decedents' primary care providers certify the majority of natural deaths which are not reported to the Office of the Medical Examiner.

According to Pennsylvania Revised Statutes, certain types of death must be reported to the medical examiner (typically those that are sudden, unexpected, and/or violent in nature – see "Legal Authority" below). After receiving a report of death, forensic investigators perform a preliminary investigation to ascertain whether the death falls under DCOME jurisdiction. If this is the case, the DCOME conducts a medicolegal death investigation (that may include an autopsy) and is in charge of determining the cause and manner of death on the death certificate.

In addition to death certification, the DCOME statutorily performs investigations for cremation approvals. A cremation investigation involves review of the death certificate to ensure that the cause and manner of death are consistent with a natural death and, if applicable, verification of the location of death as reported by the funeral director.

Mission, Vision, and Core Values

Mission

The mission of the medical examiner is to conduct expert medicolegal investigations into deaths that occur under statutorily prescribed circumstances. The findings of these investigations are then independently shared with members of the public and relevant agencies to improve public safety and health.

Vision

By having licensed practitioners and professionally trained staff who conduct medicolegal investigations and adhere to industry standards in a setting striving for industry accreditation, we aspire to establish ourselves as a trustworthy source of accurate, scientifically supported assessments of deaths in our community.

Core Values

<u>Service</u> – The highest value that we uphold is service. We pledge to provide efficient, uplifting, moral, and compassionate service to the general public and to one another.

<u>Integrity</u>- We commit to conducting ourselves respectfully and professionally at all times when interacting with the people we serve and with one another. Legal Authority

The Delaware County Office of the Medical Examiner fulfills a core function mandated by the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania's for each of the counties.

Act 154, Section 1218-B, states,

- (A) Duty. The Coroner (Medical Examiner), having a view of the body, shall investigate the facts and circumstances concerning a death that appears to have happened within the county, notwithstanding where the cause of the death may have occurred, for the purpose of determining whether or not an autopsy or inquest should be conducted in the following cases:
 - (1) A sudden death not caused by a readily recognizable disease or, if the cause of death cannot be properly certified by a physician on the basis of prior recent medical attendance.
 - (2) A death occurring under suspicious circumstances, including if alcohol, a drug or another toxic substance may have had a direct bearing on the outcome.
 - (3) A death occurring as a result of violence or trauma, whether apparently homicidal, suicidal or accidental, including, but not limited to, a death due to mechanical, thermal, chemical, electrical or radiational injury, drowning, cave-in or subsidence.
 - (4) A death in which trauma, chemical injury, drug overdose or reaction to a drug or medication or medical treatment was a primary or secondary, direct or indirect, contributory, aggravating or precipitating cause of death.
 - (5) A perioperative death in which the death is not readily explainable on the basis of prior disease.
 - (6) A death in which the body is unidentified or unclaimed.
 - (7) A death known or suspected to be due to contagious disease and constituting a public hazard.
 - (8) A death occurring in prison or a penal institution or while in the custody of the police.
 - (9) A death of an individual whose body is to be cremated, buried at sea or otherwise disposed of so as to be unavailable for examination thereafter.
 - (10) A sudden and unexplained infant death.
 - (11) A stillbirth.
- (B) Purpose. The purpose of an investigation under subsection (a) shall be to determine:
 - (1) The cause and manner of the death.
 - (2) Whether or not there is sufficient reason for the coroner to believe that the death may have resulted from a criminal act or criminal neglect of a person other than the deceased.
- (C) Requirements. As part of an investigation under subsection (a), the coroner shall determine the identity of the deceased and notify the next of kin of the deceased.

Organization of the Office of the Medical Examiner

The DCOME is divided into departmental sections based on the following services:

Administration and Administration Support- Provide leadership and overall direction to the department. Administrative support comprises business support, reception, scheduling, records management, data entry, analytic reporting, and validation for electronic death certificates. This section also includes a Bereavement Coordinator who serves as a family advocate to assist bereaved family members in interacting with DCOME.

Morgue Operations- DCOME forensic pathologists are physicians who are trained and board-certified in the medical subspecialty of forensic pathology, and work under the direction of the Chief Medical Examiner. They make jurisdictional case decisions, approve organ and tissue donation requests, conduct postmortem examinations, certify deaths, review records and results, formulate medical conclusions, author autopsy reports, and provide expert testimony in legal proceedings. They also consult with experts in neuropathology, odontology, and anthropology as needed.

Autopsy technicians provide technical support for the examination of bodies admitted to DCOME's facility. Their duties include overseeing intake and release of decedents, assisting with postmortem radiography, taking autopsy photographs, performing autopsy eviscerations, and maintaining inventory of postmortem specimens.

Forensic Investigations- Led by the Chief of Forensic Investigations, who is certified by the American Board of Medicolegal Death Investigators (ABMDI) for Medicolegal Death Investigations, Forensic Investigators receive reports of death, conduct interviews, collect evidence, photograph the scene and body, evaluate scenes, and gather records and histories. They are the eyes and ears of the pathologists and are most often the face of the agency, interacting with other agency partners and the public.


Evidence- The evidence technician is responsible for overseeing the security, distribution, maintenance, and inventory of all collected evidence. The evidence technician safeguards the chain of custody of all evidence.

Staff Professional Growth

Annual Reviews-

All employees must attend an annual review with their immediate supervisor to assess their performance and assess additional training if needed. This feedback session focuses on professional growth for the individual employee. Each employee will have a review to identify certifications that may be required, such as the American Board of Death Medicolegal Investigator and other professional certificates in their respective fields. If the employee lacks different areas of their job duties, a Performance Improvement Plan (PIP) can be initiated to get the employee back on track.

Employee Recognition-

The DCOME will focus on employee recognition. This program will be awarded quarterly to employees who have shown initiative or championed change, improved the quality of work operations, improved safety programs, provided guidance and coaching sessions with new employees, and generally went above and beyond their regular work duties.

Training-

The DCOME has developed an intensive training program for all employees. There is mandatory training and a variety of elective-style classes/courses that fit within each employee's job category. These are broken down into Forensic Investigations, Morgue Operations (Autopsy Techs and Pathologists), evidence management, and general administrative functions. The employee has access to 20 plus elective-style classes and must choose a number per year. Certifications such as CPR, fire extinguisher operations, blood-borne pathogens, and harassment-type classes are some examples of annual mandatory training. Specific courses, such as FEMA Incident Command System (ICS), will be required for all new hires' first year.

Mental Health-

Working in the death investigation field can be physically and mentally exhausting. Management is committed to the well-being of each employee's mental health status. A weekly "peer support" newsletter with links and contact information for coping with stress and other mental health and emotional well-being counseling services is sent to all employees.

<u>Dr. Albert Chu</u> was appointed as the Chief Medical Examiner in October 2023 and leads morgue operations, including managing all pathologists, forensic specialists, and autopsy technicians.

Dr. Chu completed undergraduate and graduate studies at Johns Hopkins University and received his medical degree from the State University of New York at Buffalo. <u>Jeffrey E. Lange</u> was hired in September of 2022 as the Administrator for the DCOME. Mr. Lange leads the administrative support functions of the office.

Mr. Lange is originally from New Jersey and is a retired Chief of Police from the State of Maine. Mr. Lange has served in various public safety positions (Corrections, Fire, and Police) since 1989 and has completed three tours as a Law Enforcement Professional (LEP) in Afghanistan and Iraq. <u>Amber Weeks</u> was hired in June 2023 as the Chief of Forensic Investigations for the Office of the Medical Examiner. MS. Weeks leads the forensic investigations and evidence sections of the office.

Ms. Weeks is a board-certified Forensic Investigator with the American Board of Medicolegal Death Investigators (ABMDI). Ms. Weeks has served as an investigator for seven years at the State of NJ Medical Examiner's Office before her role at the Delaware County Office of the Medical Examiner. Ms. Weeks is a registered nurse in New Jersey and Pennsylvania and holds a license in forensic nursing in NJ, a Bachelor of Arts in Anthropology with a Crime Scene Investigations certification from the University of Central Florida, a Bachelor of Science in Nursing from Drexel

University, and is currently completing her studies towards her Doctor of Nursing Practice Degree through Hawai'i Pacific University. Ms. Weeks will obtain her Executive Leadership certificate from Villanova University through the CLIMB leadership program in 2024 for Emergency Management professionals in Delaware County, PA.

Carlita Ferguson was hired in September 1996 by the County of Delaware as a clerk for the Bureau of Elections. In January 1997, she transferred to the Office of Judicial Support, where she worked as a prearraignment clerk. In 1999, Ms. Ferguson transferred to the Juvenile Detention Center, where she worked as a Control Center Operator and then as a Lead Detention Officer for the female unit. In September of 2004, Ms. Ferguson transferred over to the DCOME, where she became the first hired Black female Forensic Investigator for the county. Ms. Ferguson, also during this tenure, was employed with Vision Quest, a program designed to help adjudicated delinquent youth transition from incarceration back to the community. Greg Reigel was hired in June 2006 by the County of Delaware. In 2015, Mr. Riegel transferred to the DCOME as an Autopsy Technician. Mr. Riegel is a skilled and dedicated Autopsy Technician with a meticulous approach to post-mortem examinations. He plays a crucial role in supporting DCOME forensic pathologists and helping the pathologists accurately determine the cause and manner of death. Ms. Tiano holds a Bachelor of Science Degree in Biology from Temple University and a Master of Science Degree in Forensic Medicine from the Philadelphia College of Osteopathic Medicine (PCOM). Ms. Tiano is a board-certified American Board of Medicolegal Death Investigator (ABMDI). She leads the Child Death Review Board for SUID (Sudden Unexplained Infant Deaths) for the office. She is currently working on a project to examine and enhance standard practices and guidelines in nursing training within public health

settings for SUID. Ms. Tiano is deeply passionate about Forensic Medicine and aspires to attend medical school to become a Forensic Pathologist.

Agnes Connor was hired by the DCOME in February 2023 as a Forensic Investigator. Before her current role, Ms. Connor was a contracted employee of the DCOME, fulfilling duties as an autopsy technician and subsequently as a forensic investigator since 2016. Possessing certification as a board-certified Medicolegal Death Investigator (ABMDI), Ms. Connor also brings over two decades of experience as an Emergency Room Nurse to her professional repertoire.

During her time there, Destiny demonstrated exceptional dedication by pursuing certification as an autopsy technician, expanding her skill set to contribute directly to the forensic investigation process. Additionally, she is actively engaged in cross-training initiatives in Forensic Investigations, showcasing her determination to become an indispensable asset to the team. Complementing her practical experience, Destiny is pursuing a Bachelor of Science in General Studies at Delaware County Community College. Her educational journey is poised to continue focusing on pre-medical studies, which aligns with her aspiration to become a forensic pathologist. Destiny transitioned to the Office of the Medical Examiner's Medical Analyst position in March 2024.

<u>Nicolette Sambucci</u> was hired by the DCOME in February 2024 as the Evidence Technician. Ms. Sambucci completed her Bachelor of Arts and Science degree at The University of Tennessee, where she double majored in Forensic Anthropology and Criminology/ Criminal Justice. This upcoming year, Ms. Sambucci will start working towards her master's degree in Forensic Science with a concentration in Forensic DNA/ Genealogy. One of her goals is to become a certified Forensic Investigator for the Office of the Medical Examiner.

Dr. Michelle Nagurney was hired by the DCOME in March of 2024 as a Forensic Pathologist. Dr. Nagurney is board-certified in anatomic and forensic pathology from the American Board of Pathology. Before coming to Delaware County, she was a fellow in forensic pathology at the Allegheny County Office of the Medical Examiner and subsequently worked at the Philadelphia Medical Examiner's Office as an Associate Medical Examiner. She obtained her medical degree from the University of Pittsburgh School of Medicine. Her forensic interests include child and maternal fatalities, and she has participated in co-sleeping and neonatal infectious disease research.









Budget, Capital, and Grant-Funded Projects

- The operating budget for the DCOME in 2023 was \$2,688.072, and most of these funds were spent in the Morgue Operations Division. Pathology examinations, the cost of salaries for physicians, scientific testing (toxicology), and supplies are just a small sample of the expenses in the morgue. The DCOME operates very similarly to healthcare practices.
- Capital Funded Purchases
 - o There were no capital-funded expenditures in 2023.
- Grant Funded Equipment
 - o There were no grant-funded expenditures for 2023.

Professional Partnerships

The DCOME continued the paid work agreement with the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania's Department of Public Health, Office of Drug Surveillance and Misuse Prevention. This work agreement generates \$10,000 for the County's general fund annually. The DCOME is required to provide drug-related statistical data twice a year. This is a multi-year work agreement between the agencies.

DCTS

The DCOME has partnered with the Delaware County Technical School (DCIU), allowing high school juniors and seniors enrolled in the medical career classes to view adult autopsies as part of their teaching program.

The DCOME has also partnered with the Delaware County
Health Department and the Delaware County Department of
Human Services for several different death reviews. The initial
partnership was established in November of 2022. It will
provide insight not only into child death reviews but also into
suicides, overdose deaths, violent deaths, and motor vehicle

accidents resulting in death.

The DCOME has partnered with the Pennsylvania Institute of Technology (PIT), allowing students enrolled in the Licensed Practical Nursing program to perform and have hands-on experiences / clinical rotations three days a week working alongside our pathologists.






The DCOME has continued our partnership with Gift of Life. Gift of Life coordinates the recovery of organs and tissues for transplant. The complex organ and tissue donation and transplant process involves collaborating with highly skilled medical and investigative professionals at many levels. Working in partnership with healthcare teams, investigative teams, and other medical professionals, Gift

of Life provides extensive and compassionate services to help ensure every opportunity for donation and transplantation.

The DCOME reestablished our continued professional working relationships with many other organizations, such as the Delaware County Police Chiefs Association, the Delaware County 911 Center, Delaware County Emergency Management, the Delaware Emergency Management, and the Delaware County Regional EMS Office and the various funeral and cremation services in Delaware and surrounding counties.


Data-Sharing Collaboration

As mentioned, the DCOME shares statistical data with various governmental organizations in the County and the Commonwealth, along with non-government /civic organizations. This information comes in the form of drug-related deaths, firearms-related deaths, suicides, and infant deaths, to name a few. The importance of these partnerships allows for better decision-making based on factual data to assist in the development of prevention and outreach efforts, improvement of safety plans, adjustment of service delivery, and development/update of policy.



Jurisdictions We Support

The DCOME supports 50 jurisdictions in Delaware County. It works with 42 Police Agencies, the State Police, the Delaware County District Attorney's Office, and the Criminal Investigative Division (CID). The DCOME also services five hospital systems and other various nursing home systems in Delaware County.



Community Involvement

The DCOME participated or assisted in community-sponsored events in Delaware County. Some included the Toys4Tots Toy Drive and the Delaware County Health Department Food Drive.





Future Opportunities for 2024

The DCOME plans to conduct community outreach programs to educate the public, hospitals, hospice agencies, and nursing homes on the mandatory reporting of deaths. The DCOME will also provide awareness training to Delaware County law enforcement agencies, EMS, and fire departments.



Other outreach areas will include participating in mass fatality planning with the Emergency Management of Delaware County, the Southeast Healthcare Coalition, and the Delaware County Healthcare Emergency Preparedness Group, assisting community partners in preparing for mass fatality events.

DCOME's Bereavement Coordinator will enhance the notification process for missing persons and increase our capabilities to identify unknown individuals. Enhancements will be made through technology advancements and working with the community and law enforcement to identify our unidentified decedents.








A total of 169 Drug Deaths for 2023




Of the 169 drug deaths, 128 were related to Fentanyl-This accounts for 76% of all drug deaths





Of the 169 drug deaths, 58 were related to Xylazine. This accounts for 34% of all drug deaths.

**Please note many times, these drugs are mixed with other drugs such as Fentanyl and other opioids.





2023 Neighboring County Statistics




